






South Carolina

- Population: 5,084,127
- Land Area: 32,020 sq. mi.
- 70 Hospitals
- 7 Freestanding Emergency Departments
- 4 Critical Access Hospitals

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What is Trauma

- "An injury to living tissue caused by an extrinsic agent"
- National Trauma Data Standard Patient Inclusion Criteria
 - S00-99 (Injuries to specific body parts)
 - Excluding superficial injuries
 - T07 (unspecified multiple regions)
 - T14 (Injury of unspecified body region)
 - T20-T28 (burns by specific body parts)
 - T30-32 (burn by TBSA percentages)
 - T79.A1-T79.A9 (Traumatic Compartment Syndrome)
 - Must also include: hospital admission, patient transfer, or patient death



Trauma Centers


- American College of Surgeons Committee on Trauma
 - Resource for the Optimal Care of Injured Patients
- Whole facility designation, not just Emergency Department
- Dedicated trauma administration staffing
 - o Trauma Medical Director
 - o Trauma Program Manager
- Level designation based on increasingly rigorous criteria



SC Trauma System

• 16 Adult Trauma Centers

- o 5 Level I
- o 2 Level II
- o 9 Level III
- 3 Pediatric Trauma Centers
- Located across 12 counties
- Governed by:
 - o Regulation 61. 2016
 - SC Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC)
 - Trauma Advisory Council (TAC)






Level IV

- Summer 2017 Level IV Trauma Designation Subcommittee
- April 2018 Criteria & protocols approved by TAC
- Most accessible level of the trauma system
- Designed with Small/Rural hospitals in mind






Data Collection & Analysis

- DHEC Emergency Services and Trauma Division
 - NEMSIS National Emergency Medical Services Information System
 - September 1, 2017 February 28, 2019

- Visual and Analytical Software Analysis
 - o Excel, Tableau, GIS
 - Two-sample one-tailed t-tests
 - Alpha Value (0.05)



Filters & Limitations



- Accuracy
 - Records removed for impossibilities
- Specificity
 - T14 Trauma to an unspecified region
- Utilization
 - Counties displayed low trauma volume



South Carolina Mean

 18 minutes 48 seconds

- Maximum
 - Saluda 36 minutes

Minimum

 Greenwood – 10 minutes



Transport Methods

• 12.6% of all records were air transport

Average Times

- o 18.69 minutes for air transports
- 18.81 minutes for ground transports


• Slightly more urban

- o 52% Urban
- o 48% Rural

- Mean Transport Time 31.7 Minutes
- 5 Counties




- 2 North Carolina Trauma Centers

Georgia


- 473 Transports

Counties without Trauma Centers


- 40% of SC Trauma volume
- 23.4 minute average transport
 - \circ Vs. 15.9 minutes w/ Trauma Centers
- Air Transports
 - $\circ~~$ 66% of all SC air transports
 - 19 minute average vs 25 minute ground






Rural Counties

- 18% of SC trauma volume
- 24 Minute Average Transport
- Air Transport
 - \circ $\,$ 33% of Rural Transports $\,$
 - 22 minute average vs 25 minutes for ground
 - 60% of counties used air more than ground





CAH Counties



- 26 Minute average transport time
- Split evenly between air and ground transports
- 24 minute air transport vs
 27 minute ground transport



EMS Agencies


- 11 EMS vehicles is the SC median per county
- 18 Counties above median 17.2 minute average travel time
 Compared to 26 at or below median 24.2 minute average travel time

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RAI

- 9 Counties above median have an established trauma center
- 2 Counties above median are designated fully rural
- No CAHs were above median




Large Urban Counties

- Charleston, Greenville, Horry, Richland, and Spartanburg
- Nearly 1.9 million South Carolina residents
- Level I Trauma Centers
 - Charleston and Horry both have other lower levels



Trauma Volume


- Top 5 counties of need by trauma volume
- Aiken, Beaufort, Berkeley, Georgetown and Pickens





Travel Time


- Top 5 counties of need by travel time
- Allendale, Colleton, Fairfield, Marion & Newberry

- 4 Critical Access Hospitals
- Abbeville, Allendale, Edgefield, Williamsburg





Trauma Care Fund

- Distribution should be increased for <u>counties</u> which:
 - Do not have an established trauma center
 - Are designated fully rural
 - Experience higher rates of trauma incidents
 - Have longer EMS transport times
 - Utilize higher rates of air transports


• Distribution should be increased for <u>facilities</u> which:

- Are Critical Access Hospitals
- New to the Trauma System
- Recently raised level of designation
- See higher volumes of trauma patients
